# My faith journey during Covid 19: written by Mrs Rita Holden.

We have all been living through some strange and difficult times during the past two years. I have been one of those who have had to 'shield' during lockdown.

I missed very much attending church, which has always filled a major part of my life. I have friends who have died and not been able to attend their funerals. Also, friends who have been seriously ill in hospital and I have been unable to visit, others who have dementia. Thankfully Fr Tim was able to get the newsletter delivered to us, and was available on the telephone. We were all very grateful for this. I discovered Catholic Daily Masses on the internet and visited places I have been on holiday in the past—rekindling many happy memories. Radio Lancashire has been on permanently from 6am, which has kept me informed of many important news items. The daily 'Keeping Faith' slot was interesting where different people explained how they dealt with life during Covid. I also loved Sunday morning 8am service with the sermons, the singing from all over the country.

The telephone was an excellent way of keeping in touch with friends. Many people offered to shop for me so my quality of life remained the same Doorstep deliveries were the norm. The Arrupe pupils from Stonyhurst College could no longer entertain the Parish, but I became pen friends to two students with my letters being collected from my doorstep by Fr Tim.

The Coffee Stop at St John's Church where we had been meeting all our friends had to stop, so we kept in touch by telephone as most of us were shielding. Friends wanted to take me for the Covid vaccination and also the booster I have made many new friends and my values have changed as I have prayed more—*exceedingly great is the power of prayer*!

So , as the hymn says: "one more step along the road I go" and also in Sister Act the movie the song "I will follow him".

# Thoughts from a parishioner on how I coped with my spiritual/prayer life during lockdown.

For me personally at first I found lockdown and having to stay at home for long periods of time not as difficult as I expected as my home and garden became my safe place in my own bubble.

However, not going to Mass and not being able to see and talk to other parishioners every week as well as taking part in the Mass both spiritually and receiving communion was very strange and I did, at first, find that a big gap. Once it was possible to link to streamlined Masses both locally and nationally I found it easier to cope spiritually. Knowing that so many others were in the same situation and that I was not alone watching the Mass online gave me comfort and ease of mind. For me, the ability to get outside and sit and reflect in my garden also gave me solace. It was lovely to see that God's great creation in nature carried on as normal even though we ourselves were in a type of limbo.

I really looked forward to joining in with other parishioners on Zoom to say the rosary. Being able to see and have chats with them was so nice and brought a sense of normality in our very strange lives. Sharing and reading the rosary over zoom brought a sense of parishioners coming together even if only online. When it became possible to return to celebrate Mass in church after such a long time was something I very much looked forward to, even with all the necessary regulations. We are very lucky here at St Peter's Stonyhurst to have such a large parish church with so much space. This helped me take a leap of faith and attend Mass again although I have to admit that at first it was something I had to fight with emotionally and physically.

I have also been very blessed in my personal life as I have had wonderful support from friends and family. I never felt isolated or alone at any point in these last months and years. Their continuing presence

in my life has been something I say a prayer for every day.

'For the Year 4 pupils at St Joseph's, it had been a long wait for first Reconciliation and first Holy Communion, but their sacramental preparation journey concluded joyfully in mid-October.

The effects of the pandemic meant that the start of their sessions had to be delayed by over a year, but the fourteen children and their families were able to meet each Sunday before the 9.30 Mass, albeit spread out in St Peter's. Week by week, they discovered more about the love of God that forgives and heals us On a beautiful early July evening at St Peter's, they had their first Reconciliation, their initial nervousness turning to the broadest of smiles after this wonderful encounter. In the autumn the focus of their study and prayer was God's gift of himself in the eucharist, with Fr Tim also tailoring his homilies to the younger audience (who often found themselves acting out the Gospel reading!) and using the special Eucharistic prayers for children. The great day finally came just before the October half-term, and it was so good to be together again in St Peter's as the children received Jesus in Holy Communion for the first time. We are grateful to Stephen Winckley and the catering team at St Mary's Hall for the lovely reception afterwards.

Our thanks go to Fr Tim, to catechists Sarah Hodkinson and Tren Morley, and to Mrs Orr and Mrs O'Connor from St Joseph's for all their help and support. We look forward to seeing the children and their families at parish Masses in the future. Please keep them in your prayers as they continue in their journey of faith. Invitations to participate in our 2022 sacramental preparation programme will be given to the current Year threes after Christmas.

# **Jesuit Pastoral Conference 2021**

### Walking together towards a new vision of Church

Two members of the Parish - Lucy Harrison and Andrew Snape - accompanied Father Tim to the triennial Jesuit Pastoral Conference at Swanwick in Derbyshire, between 28th - 30th October. The Conference was a very stimulating and enjoyable experience, a chance to re-connect with delegates from previous conferences and a fascinating insight into the diversity of the other Jesuit Parishes within the British Province with representatives from Boscombe, London (Stamford Hill, Farm Street, Southall, Walm Lane Polish Community), Liverpool, Preston, Stonyhurst, Glasgow and Edinburgh.

The topic of the Conference was that of "Synodality" following the opening of the Universal Synod of the Church in Rome by Pope Francis on 9th-10th October where he invited the world wide Church to consider what God expects of the Church in the third millennium. The Synod will consist of a number of stages or phases before in 2023 Bishops from every Diocese across the world will meet to draft a Report to be submitted to Rome prior to the final phase of the Synod taking place in the Vatican later that year. Whilst there will therefore be a Diocesan response to this invitation the aim of the Conference was to consider the response from the Jesuit parishes in the British Province.

There had been some small amount of preparatory work required of all delegates prior to the Conference of which the most welcome was a very well organised pre-conference Zoom meeting during which delegates were introduced to the subject matter of the Conference: the Pope's wish for us to be a "Synodal Church", by which he means Bishops, Priests and people journeying together in a common mission or as Pope Francis himself said "to inspire people to dream about the Church we are called to be, to make people's hopes flourish, to stimulate trust, to bind up wounds, to weave new and deeper relationships, to learn from one another, to build bridges, to enlighten minds, warm hearts and restore strength to our hands for our common mission."

As the first stage of the Synod is intended to be a consultation and listening process, delegates were asked to consider how this journeying together is happening today and what steps the Holy Spirit is asking the Church to take and to consider how the faithful can journey together, both within their Church communities and outside them. Pope Francis asks the faithful to look to the horizon with hope, to listen deeply to each other and to the Holy Spirit. The Church is asked to live Communion, to achieve Participation and to open herself to Mission.

Prior to the Conference delegates were asked to create moments to have conversations about journeying together, both with practicing Catholics and with those who no longer practice, or who have never done so. What did they think about the Church? What have their experiences been? How do they think it should move forwards from here? The conversations were fascinating and enlightening. Once people started talking they wanted to continue. Some said "you don't want to know what I think", but when reassured they went on to share deeply.

At the Conference delegates were privileged to hear an excellent speaker, Father James Hanvey SJ and to work in small "listening" groups with people from the other Jesuit Parishes. Much networking was done over coffee, at mealtimes and when relaxing in the evening. There was an uplifting Mass each evening and it was wonderful to be together again after experiencing the restrictions of the COVID pandemic for so long.

There were many take home messages, which included: the importance of listening deeply ("spiritual listening"); that God is to be found in the secular too; to recognise the value of creating opportunities for people to talk about the Church, past, present and future and their experiences of it; the difference between knowledge "about" God, the Church and the wider human family and knowledge "by acquaintance"; the importance of generosity and gratitude; the importance of reaching out to those that the world rejects; to recognise and welcome 'the Church behind the pillar' and those on the margins of society who often fail to be seen and to recognise that every person's view-point matters.

In February/March 2022 it is hoped to offer a number of workshops at Fr. Tim's house or by Zoom, to consult and listen in a Parish context and to consider how this Parish, guided by the Holy Spirit can journey together in the-mission of the world-wide Church as Pope Francis invites us all to do.
