On With The Roof! Now For The Heating!

- Wonderful Effort
- £73,000 raised
- Work starts now

By the time you read this, the scaffolding may already be up and work starting to replace the roof of the Memorial Hall - Hurst Green's Village Hall. Read all about the work of the Project Team and how you have helped on page 2.

It has been a tremendous effort. Over £14,000 has been raised through local fundraising, including over £6,000 in 'Sponsor a Tile' for the roof. Thank you to everyone who has contributed.

The heating is next, and, yes, it will cost even more. But a good heating system will have benefits both for our community and for the environment. By using ground-source heating, drawn from the Bayley Field, as the base heating for the Memorial Hall, we will reduce our carbon footprint by 2.5 tonnes a year, a real saving.

School News -Getting To Grips With Plastic

St. Joseph's R.C. Primary School is delighted to have been instrumental in triggering Longridge's mission to become a plastic-free town.

Year 5 pupil Jeannie Wilkinson, nine, of Hurst Green, contacted the council about plastic pollution. The class had been inspired by a visit by Jesuit Missions and the Wombles to take action to try to slow down climate change. The class wrote letters to a variety of supermarkets, shops and local people. In a passionate letter to the Mayor, Cllr Steve Ashcroft, Jeannie highlighted her concerns about damage to the planet and the environment by the dumping and burning of plastic goods and packaging. The Mayor visited the school to meet Jeannie and her class mates last year and then invited her to the launch of Plastic Free Longridge. This initiative is working with local businesses to cut down and eventually eliminate the use of single-use plastic in Longridge.

SECURING THE ROOF - HEATING THE HALL

Peter Butterfield reports . . .

After months of fundraising, work is about to start on Phase One of the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall and already money is coming in for Phase Two. The first phase is to replace the roof, which has come to the end of its manufactured life and before it starts leaking. The scaffolding may already be up as you read this - work starts soon. The whole of the roof is being replaced at a total cost of £73,000. This was a daunting figure for the Project Team, which was formed from members of the Village Hall committee and the Parish Council, but, thanks to local fund raising efforts and sterling work by Margaret Carrington and Barbara Herd to secure grant support, the necessary cash has been raised.

A total of £14,000 was raised through local fund raising events such as the Roof Tile Sponsorship, which raised $\pounds 6,000$, the Auction of Promises, Hurst Green's Got Talent, the Wine and Beer Festival, film nights at St John's School Hall and Bingo at St Peter's Club.

Grant funding came from the following organisations:

Lancashire Environmental Fund - £30,000

Harold and Alice Trust - £1,000

Awards for All - £10,000

Acre Government Village Hall Funding - £15,000

Village Hall Committee - £3,000

Although improving the heating of the hall was a prime objective for the Project Team it was acknowledged that first repairing the aging roof was the priority. Now that funding is in place for replacing the roof, including improved insulation, attention is now being turned to the heating. Right at the outset the Project Team decided that we needed an environmentally friendly heating system. A professional project manager was appointed and a contractor has been selected from five tenders to install ground source heating. It will cost just under £100,000 exclusive of VAT but this does not include the necessary ground works on the land behind the hall, including part of Bailey Field, to enable the laying of the heating pipes. The Project Team is working with the farming community and we are hopeful they will rally round to help with this aspect. We also have to find the funding for the heat pump from our own resources to be eligible for feedback tariffs. Work is due to start in the summer, dependent on the necessary money being raised.

In total, the heating will cost in excess of $\pounds 120,000$ - a daunting figure, but, given the success of the grant applications for the roof, Margaret and Barbara are optimistic in getting grant support. However, that comes with an important caveat. Grants will only materialise if we can demonstrate that the local community is working to raise money itself. That is why support for local fund-raising events is so crucial.

Bingo nights at St Peter's Club, for instance, have been very successful, already raising in excess of £1,000. The more people who attend every other Sunday evening, the more we will raise and, crucially, the more we can demonstrate to funders that we are doing our bit.

Another way parishioners can show their support is by buying tickets for another rip-roaring Hurst Green's Got Talent on March 28th. It is always a good night with local people showing they really are talented, and last year we raised in excess of £2,000. Following the success of the Roof Tile Sponsorship, the Project Team have come up with another way to support the heating project – and this time, in addition to helping to raise cash, you will also be doing something to help the environment and combat global warming.

By installing the new ground-source heating, we will be reducing our carbon footprint by 2.5 tonnes over the year. Can we possibly appeal to you once more and ask you to help with the cost of the new heating by contributing towards the sponsorship?

Des Harwood has done his homework and worked out that our carbon footprint saving in terms of pounds will equate to roughly 5000 lbs – therefore £10 will buy a reduction of 10lbs in terms of carbon footprint sponsorship. We did so well with the roof tile sponsorship with almost everyone contributing. Therefore in mid-February we will be putting a notice up on the notice-board to ask you to:

Please donate £10 per 10lb carbon - the target being 5000lbs.

If you have any other ideas for fund-raising please get in touch with Margaret or Barbara – we would love to hear from you.

Already we have been promised several thousand pounds in grants but there is still a long way to go. And remember, if we don't raise money ourselves we will be unlikely to get grant aid. We need your support. We have finances in place for the roof, now let's get the heating sorted.

WHAT'S ON, ROUND THE GREEN

There is always a lot going on in and around Hurst Green, with vibrant sports clubs, social events and community groups. A round-up of some of the many things to do.

Village Hall Project: please note, groups using the Memorial Hall (Village Hall) in the evenings and at weekends should be running normally during the building work. Please check during building work, especially for those running during weekdays morning or afternoon. Inevitably there will be some disruption while work on the roof goes ahead. In addition, parking on the Village Hall car park will be restricted for a time. The Project Team, the Memorial Hall Committee and the Parish Council apologise for any inconvenience caused during building work on the roof, and, later this year it is hoped, when installing the new heating system.

The WI - The WI meet on the 4th Thursday of every month at the Village Hall - time, 7.30 pm. We have a varied programme of speakers and welcome any visitors. It was lovely to see some ladies at our last meeting that have just moved into the village on the new estate. Please come along and enjoy - we're a friendly crew! **Bingo in the Club** - Fortnightly bingo in St Peter's Club - all welcome. Many thanks to Peter and his staff. The next dates are 16th Feb and 1st March. Many thanks also to Roger for calling out the numbers! We have raised over £1,000 up to now towards the heating, a great effort - and good fun.

Seniors Party - Every year, volunteers put on a party at the Village Hall for local pensioners. This year's was on Saturday 15th February, with the usual delicious food, not to mention the amazing raffle thanks to Bunty and Phil. **The Hobbits Baby and Toddler Playgroup** - It's on every Thursday during term time 9.30-11.30am usually at the Village Hall but currently at St John's Old School Hall. It's £1 per adult and £1 per child (max £3) - under ones free. Tea/coffee snacks and biscuits. It's on Facebook as The Hobbits baby and toddler playgroup Hurst Green. Lots of toys to play with and a chance for children and parents to make friends.

Youth Group - The Youth Group meets every 2 weeks during term time at the Village Hall. Members have to be aged 9 and above and can take part in a number of activities. We have pool, badminton, table tennis, music and a tuck shop. When the weather improves we have outdoor activities such as football, rounders, and the local park. We also hold annual events such as halloween fancy dress, Christmas and summer BBQ parties as well as a subsidised off-site activities such as trampolining or tubing down Pendle Hill. Many people will remember fondly Rita Marsland who died at the end of August. A packed St Peter's Church, Stonyhurst for her funeral was testimony to her place in the parish over many years.

Rita grew up in Cherry Tree, Blackburn and attended Notre Dame Convent School, showing an early talent for art. She went on to train as a primary school teacher and many children benefited from her continuing love of art and her special gifts as a teacher. Rita married Francis Marsland and they had four sons. After periods at Ellesmere Port, Padiham and Wilpshire she and Francis settled in the home they treasured most of all, Lane Ends Farm, Dutton. Here Rita was able to enjoy family life and engage in her artistic interests, horse-riding and a range of local activities, particularly Hurst Green W.I., and the caring community that she treasured so much.

Rita had suffered a great deal of ill-health over the past few years but showed tremendous strength and determination in battling through adversity in order to live as normal a life as possible, greatly supported by her family.

Josie Holden

Sadly, Josie Holden who lived for many years in Shireburn Cottages died recently, having had to move to a care home in Longridge. Josie was born in County Wicklow in Ireland, one of 6 children. At the age of 17 she and a friend came over to work in Liverpool, and from there they moved to Hodder Place, Stonyhurst. In 1950 Josie married Jack Holden of Woodfields, and they set up home at Smithy Gates, moving later to Shireburn Cottages where they brought up their daughters, Pauline and Angela.

Josie, who was widowed some years ago, was a keen garden. She used to enjoy chatting to passers-by over her garden wall and discussing plants with them. She was a member of the Bowling Club, and was a regular at Sunday night Bingo at the Club. Josie also very much enjoyed her trips to Lourdes with the annual Stonyhurst Pilgrimage. When she became less active, Josie got a mobility scooter which gave her a new lease of life!

Helen Clarke

One of Hurst Green's oldest residents, Helen Clarke died peacefully at home after a short illness in November, aged 96. Helen was born in Salford and grew up in Prestwich. She began work apprenticed as a dressmaker. During the war she worked in the Army Pay Corps. She met her husband Alf, a pilot in the RAF, and they had three sons and a daughter. Helen moved to Wilpshire in 1961, working for a Blackburn pharmaceutical company. Then, aged 56, somewhat surprisingly, she became the co-purchaser of the bobbin mill in Hurst Green. The business became Hurst Green Plastics, and she was still working at the age of 92. She had the twin achievements of seeing the company celebrate 40 years of trading and personally speaking with Her Majesty the Queen at Buckingham Palace on gaining a Company award.

Her 40 years in the village were the happiest of her life. She had many personal achievements, not least passing her driving test aged 60. The village and the business, together with her 30 years with the Dominican Secular Institute and her 14 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren gave this remarkable lady a wonderful life.
