To the future

A personal point of view. Following on from my announcement about the future priestly staffing of the apostolates here in the Parish of St Peter's and the 'Chapel of Ease' in St Joseph's, it may be worth thinking now about how we practice our faith and what it means to us.

In the early 1970's, Michael Winter wrote a book entitled, 'Mission or Maintenance?' asking the question – are we a Church concerned mainly with maintenance or are we a Church which is missionary? A Church which is concerned with maintenance is concerned chiefly about how to keep things going, 'things' like mass, and the sacraments, and where appropriate and possible, the traditional devotions of the Church like public recitation of the rosary, Benediction, Stations of the Cross in Lent etc. etc. Keeping the mass and sacraments going is clearly essential. Where there is a demand for all the other traditional devotions of the church, these, too, should be encouraged and kept going, but a leading consideration of a maintenance-Church is that it is primarily concerned with its present members.

A missionary Church, however, honours all that the Church has been doing over many years, locally and nationally, but at the same time looks to encounter all people where-ever they are, whether they have faith or not, or whether they have a faith which is very different from ours. Where the love and mercy of God is experienced by the regulars who attend mass and the sacraments in their local church every Sunday etc., the missionary Church seeks to share this experience with those who live around us but who never go to church, either because they no longer see the need to go to church, or because the Catholic Church has let them down in the past, or because they are not Christian but Muslim, Hindu, Sikh or whatever. There are many other reasons, too, why people do not go to church.

The recent communal expressions of grief caused by the Manchester bombing, the Grenfell Tower disaster and terrorist attacks in London shows the need that so many in our society have to show sympathy and love to those who have been killed or hurt in some way. A missionary Church is there with those people and that is just one example of a Church that shows God's love and compassion but outside the walls of a church building as well as inside.
