400th Anniversary of the British Province of the Society of Jesus.

The Society of Jesus is divided up into administrative units called "provinces". Each province has a provincial who directs the work of the province, assigning men to mission and looking after the economic resources. Normally, but not always, a province will cover a given geographical area. Each provincial is responsible to Fr General in Rome.

The English mission of the Society of Jesus began in 1580 when the then Fr General, Everard Mercurian, sent Edmund Campion and Robert Parsons to minister to the oppressed Catholics in England. Robert Parsons was to be the superior of Jesuits who managed to smuggle themselves into the country. As it was illegal to be a Catholic, the work of these two priests had to be conducted in secret. Campion was captured in 1581, tried and executed for treason. Parsons, however, withdrew to the continent where he could better organise a constant supply of Jesuits to come to England. He also established institutions abroad to cater for the education of Catholic youth, including, in 1593, St Omer's in France, the forerunner of Stonyhurst College.

Life was complicated for the mission superior, as England did not come directly under any one province, his Jesuits being members of different European provinces.

It was common at this time for Jesuits in Catholic Europe to beg alms on a daily basis for their sustenance. This was impossible in England as it would lead to immediate arrest, so a process needed to be designed so that money could be solicited and used in our colleges abroad and for the men ministering in secret in England. In 1619 the situation came to a head with some provinces objecting to Jesuits in their territories being directed by a mission superior.

This problem was solved in 1619 when the General raised the mission to the status of a Vice-Province and he named Fr Richard Blount as the first Vice-Provincial. Importantly now those who wishes to serve in England could belong to this vice-province and its own noviciate was established.

By 1623 Fr Blount was able to demonstrate to the General in Rome that the mission had sufficient resources in terms of money and men to qualify as a Province. The then "English Province" was erected in 1623. At that time they were accepting an average of 10 men per year into the noviciate to supply our colleges and our mission with a steady supply of Jesuit priests. In 1983 the English Province became the British province. The Province is marking this important mile stone with a Mass in Farm Street Church, London, on 21st January at 12 noon. The Mass will be celebrated by Cardinal Vincent Nichols. Let us all keep the needs of our Province in our prayers.
