A message from Father PETER GRIFFITHS SJ PARISH PRIEST

### THE LATE JOHN HOLDEN an appreciation.

Sadly, John Holden, or 'John at Winkley' as he was affectionately known, died on October 1st, and what a huge gap

he has left in the parish and the village.

John was a fount of information about so many local matters, whether it was the lay out of the graves in St. Joseph's Cemetery, or anything to do with the Memorial Hall, which he helped to build.

He was a stalwart of the Village Fete for which he worked endlessly,

especially building the swing boats and other attractions for its early days, and then continuing to help in any way he could, particularly as its chairman. He was a staunch member of the Memorial Hall Committee and guided it through many of its early years.

John was always very actively involved in St. Peter's Parish, organising the May Processions, making and erecting the Christmas Crib and putting up the October Rosary Banners. He organised the Readers and Eucharistic Ministers and generally knew what would be needed by generations of Parish Priests.

He was a loyal supporter of Lourdes Pilgrimages for over thirty years, tirelessly working with the sick and handicapped.

John was a very humble artist and craftsman leaving behind three excellent pieces of work – the crucifix in St. Joseph's Cemetery, the statue of St. Joseph near the school, where he was a governor and the Nativity scene, which is placed with the Christmas tree in the centre of the village. All of these are happy reminders of a selfless, generous man who will be missed greatly.

John was often helped in his endeavours by members of his family, and latterly by his widow, Rita, who continues to live in Warren Fold

Work continues apace in the Parish cemetery. We have a small but dedicated cutting crew lead by Bernard Holden and he ensures a team is assembled to take advantage of the weather conditions. General strimming, grass cutting, hedge trimming, ornamental trees cutting, pathways litter tidied up, and other maintenance are all part of the variety of work undertaken.

In addition, the 'big tree management' programme continues, and we are grateful for the Parish funding a local professional tree surgeon to undertake some of the more specialised branch and tree cropping. As you can see from the photograph, it is a dangerous occupation and we are grateful for Peter Winstanley's expertise. We hope you see for yourself on any future visits some of the changes taking place but the above before and after photographs give some indication of the work.

The plans for the future include cutting back the branches which overhang the cemetery from outside; taking down two large trees which are leaning over in a precarious way; and focusing on the central tree area management, in particular, to try and encourage more light and therefore stronger grass growth.

We would also like to pay tribute to the late John Holden who acted as the go-between local funeral directors and Parishioners for such a long time. His knowledge and expertise was extensive and he was a valuable source of information. I'm sure he will keep an eye on us as we continue our work!

John's role has been passed on to Niall Macfarlane, so please do not hesitate to make contact with Niall on any thoughts or concerns (07786 432360) The Parish website also has reference to the guidance and policy for burial in the cemetery which was checked and approved by John Holden earlier in 2016.

Thank you again to all the Parishioners and visitors who have helped the cemetery crew safely manage the regular mowing and maintenance during the Summer season by keeping the decorative features at the grave sites to a minimum. The volunteers' safety has to be kept in mind and it is much appreciated.





### Ecumenical Churches in Hurst Green



This year has seen the arrival of the Rev Canon Brian McConkey. Brian is resident at the vicarage at Ribchester and has responsibility for St Wilfred's Ribchester, All Hallows, Mitton and us here at St John's. He has quickly become a well known face in the village and has forged friendships with all sections of our community.

Brian is keen to build on the strong ties we already have with St Peter's and St Joseph's that have been developed with the support of Father Peter Griffiths. It is on that note that we have to express our sadness at his departure. His spiritual and physical support for St John's Church has been immense. He is a good friend to our Church and we shall miss him.

However we look forward to the arrival of Father Tim Curtis and pray that our work together can continue to bring the love of Christ to our communities.

Our work together has included:

- Fairtrade fortnight, St John's and St Joseph's School supported this initiative by sharing a Fare Trade stall highlighting third world farmers
- Sharing mid week worship together followed by lunch on 3 occasions.
- Being invited to worship together at the beautiful St Joseph's Chapel, a highlight for many people at St John's.
- Giving each child at St Joseph's School a 'Real' Easter egg with the Christian Easter message as a gift from both communities.
- Worshipping together outdoors in August with a guest speaker from CAFOD.
- Raising over £600 for CAFOD
- Good Friday workshop at St John's Old School involving children and adults from all the community.

'Harvest' workshop in October at St John's Old School where children and adults came together to support the CAFOD 'BOB BOX' initiative.

The list could go on but simply indicates that there is much more that keeps us together than separates us.

In June 2017 we were delighted to welcome to a Sunday Worship a Syrian refugee family, Mussab, his wife Myrwa and their 2 year old daughter. Many people from St Peter's joined our congregation to listen to Mussab telling his story of travelling from war torn Syria to the safety of Lancashire.

Our Coffee Stop continues to be well attended from all in the community and could not operate without the support of wonderful volunteers from both churches.

We are delighted to be able to support the 'Hobbits' parent and toddler group in the village. St John's organises a rota of volunteers from all the community who provide refreshments and support for the group.

We pray that the Christian values we share will continue to help us work together to make the world a better place.
